24-hour Projected Weather Statewide:

National Weather Service, 0531 hours, 04/11/16:

A slow moving cold front located over the upper Great Lakes this morning will slide southeast and cross Pennsylvania tonight and early Tuesday.

Preceding this front, periods of rain will occur. Total storm rainfall amounts by late Tuesday morning should range from around one half of an inch across the southeastern half of Pennsylvania to nearly an inch across portions of the northwest mountains.


High temperatures today will range from the upper 40s near the New York border to the lower 60s near the Maryland border. Lows early Tuesday will be in the lower 30s across northwest Pennsylvania with a few light snow showers possible. Elsewhere, temperatures will dip in the 40s by daybreak Tuesday.

High pressure will move from the midwest to southeastern Canada Tuesday afternoon through Thursday bringing clear to partly cloudy skies and slowly moderating temperatures back to near or slightly above normal by late this week.
