DISASTER DECLARATIONS:

6/2/2016 – The Commissioners of Clearfield County have issued Declarations of Disaster Emergencies for Lawrence Township, Clearfield Borough, and Clearfield County due to severe weather and flooding.

3/23/16 - The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency announced that federal disaster aid has been made available to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to supplement commonwealth and local recovery efforts in the area affected by the severe winter storm which occurred January 22-23, 2016. The designation is FEMA-4267-DR.

24-hour Projected Weather Statewide:

National Weather Service, 0602 hours, 07/07/16:

An upper level trough will make its way through the Mid-Atlantic region today. Lingering showers are moving through the central mountains this morning so there remains a slight chance for showers there. Low clouds will continue over the region through the first half of the day as a very warm and increasingly humid southwesterly airflow will continue in Pennsylvania. Following the trough, the winds will shift to the northwest with possible afternoon showers.

A stronger system with a strong cold front will reach the state Friday and showers with thunderstorms will become likely. Fair weather and less humid air will then prevail by Saturday night.

The heat and humidity will combine to approach or reach dangerous levels for the next couple of days, particularly in the urban centers of southeastern Pennsylvania. Highs today will vary from the mid 80s along the northern border to the 90s through the Southern half of the commonwealth. Lows tonight will range from mid 60s along the New York border to the mid 70s through the southeast.

An Excessive Heat Warning is in effect until 1800 on Friday July 8th for the following counties: Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery and Philadelphia.
