III. **ACTION ITEM:** The minutes of the December 5, 2019, 9-1-1 Advisory Board meeting were accepted on a motion by Frank Jannetti, Jr.

IV. 9-1-1 Program Update

• Act 12 Revenue

- o Revenue collections in 2019 were \$318,030,576
 - Surcharge revenue was \$315,238,084
 - Interest revenue was \$2,792,492
- o 2019 Key Figures:
 - \$7.2 million decrease in wireline funds from 2018
 - \$8 million increase in wireless and VoIP funds from 2018
 - \$315.2 million average yearly surcharge collections 2016-2019

• Statewide NG911 System

- Statewide 911 Plan: PEMA procures service-based next generation 911 (NG911) solution.
 - Contract negotiations are in progress for the statewide NG911 system (ESInet and core services).
 - There is no binding commitment for the Commonwealth to contract
 - No Commonwealth obligations until a formal contract is executed
 - Remains an active procurement; additional information will be made available when possible
- o Statewide NG911 system will upgrade infrastructure to deliver 911 calls from provider to PSAP; network will also support additional public safety applications.
- o Phases of the statewide NG911 project:
 - Procurement Vendor is chosen to provide NG911 system
 - Data Collection:
 - PSAP site surveys
 - Evaluate service provider and vendor needs, POI locations, etc.
 - Network Design:
 - Finalize system design
 - Requirements compliance
 - Finalize implementation plans
 - Implementation:
 - Build out NG911 system infrastructure
 - Perform network test and turn-up
 - PSAP Deployment:
 - Collaborative planning with PSAPs, PEMA, and vendors
 - PSAP acceptance test and cutover planning
 - Transition activity and operational planning
 - Operational Support:
 - Post cutover support (monitoring, maintenance and notification),
 - Operational procedures defined for stakeholders
 - Governance established between PEMA, PSAPs and NG911 service provider

- o Discussion Point: Existing Regional ESInets
 - PEMA will seek to leverage previous 15% funding ESInet investments where possible.
 - Regional ESInets will need assessed to determine if requirements are met and/or where enhancements are needed.
 - PEMA will contact regions to discuss approach for regional ESInets
 - Maintain a separate ESInet or integrate existing regional connectivity into statewide ESInet

• 2019 15% Funding Close-Out

- o 2019 Statewide interconnectivity funding:
 - Amount available: \$47,664,982
 Award Amount: \$29,166,340
 Balance: \$18,498,642
- o 2019 15% Application Summary:
 - 94 applications were received, totaled \$44.1 million (\$57.8 million in 2018)
 - 80 of the 94 applications were funded (85%)
- o Balance of \$18,498,642 distributed to counties by formula:
 - Counties received funds March 3rd
 - PEMA suggests/recommends that Counties are conservative with funds
 - 83% formula may change, and some counties will see a reduction
 - NG911 project will begin; less 15% funds will be available for grants

• Funding Formula Update

- o Act 12 requires formula to be reviewed every 2 years; may be adjusted annually
- o Current formula was established in 2017; reviewed in 2019 with no changes
- Current Formula:
 - 3% Equal distribution
 - 30% Population
 - Remainder: uses 2010 2014 average VoIP and wireline revenue and reported expenses
- Current formula challenges:
 - Wireline and VoIP revenue data is outdated
 - No standardized accounting procedures from 2010–2014
 - Inconsistent county reporting with no method to verify reported costs
- o Funding Subcommittee focus: a fair and equitable formula for all PSAPs
- o Items to keep in mind:
 - Finding reliable data sets not subject to manipulation is a challenge
 - 18% of revenue is already being distributed to benefit all PSAPs
- o Progress towards identifying a new formula:
 - Population will likely be a major part of the formula
 - Represents where a person paid the \$1.65 for 911 service
 - Proportionate to the size of the PSAP
 - Data set is reliable
- o Formula transition plans:
 - Transition planning is an important part of changing the formula
 - PEMA and the funding subcommittee are working to develop a plan to alleviate some of the burden on counties seeing a decrease

- o Reminder:
 - Formula change will result in increases/decreases for PSAPs

Michael Vest, Montgomery County asked if PEMA will be seeking an increase to the \$1.65 fee. The next opportunity for a fee increase will be in 2024. Indications are that it will be difficult to increase the fee when the current legislation sunsets. It will take a collaborative approach between all stakeholders using objective data to clearly demonstrate the need for a fee increase and the benefits of doing so. Efforts should also focus on ensuring assessment language is clarified for IP based communication services and prepaid wireless service.

• PSAP Inventory

- o PSAP inventory will be updated in 2020
- o Act 17 of 2019: PEMA, in consultation with the Board, shall maintain and update the PSAP inventory biennially (every 2 years)
- o Collected data will be the foundational element of the "911 System Plan" process

• Training and QA/QI Reminder

- o Effective January 1, 2020: PSAPs documented training and QA/QI programs
- o Due date to submit to PEMA: May 31, 2020

• Anti-Windfall Provision

- o PSAP 2019 Combined Reports are due April 15th
- o Act 12 anti-windfall provision is in effect (35 Pa. C.S. § 5306.1 (e) (6)).
 - Enforcement is based on the **2019** Combined Report
- What is considered an excess balance:
 - A positive "Balance" amount in a PSAP's Formula Funds (83% Funds)
 - Important: expenditures may include allocations to Reserves
 - If "Balance" is dedicated to a future project/purpose, please remember to allocate funds to Reserves
